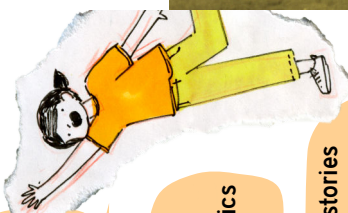

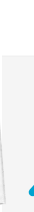

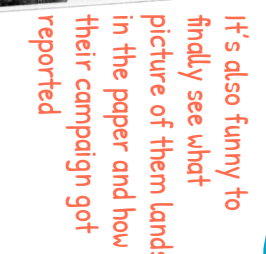

The newspaper did a good job of reporting what happened... but it also MILDLY IMPLIED that maybe the head librarian started the fire to get a better building.

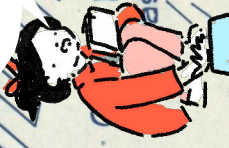


All the books were totally destroyed, apart from the ones that were checked out.



Before it became the city staple that it is nowadays, the SPL was much smaller – just one building in downtown Seattle. And on the first day of the year in 1901, the library met its worst enemy:
